

Zooming Through the Pandemic

Webinars, and emails, and Zoom, oh my! For many, the turn to digital platforms to build community, communicate effectively, and resume some semblance of everyday activities during the coronavirus

outbreak has been as frightening and overwhelming as Dorothy's journey through the forest on the way to Oz—so many unknowns and hidden barriers! Deacon Jim McAvoy shared his thoughts and feelings around this idea at the onset of our social distancing protocols. "The pandemic has disconnected, isolated and disheartened just about everyone," he said. "It's been really easy to have a glum spirit."

Yet, out of the extra screen time and reliance on strong internet connections, something else emerged from the



shadows of our pixelated pandemic reality. God has provided a way for His Church in this wilderness. What we found was "an expanded meaning to the 'domestic church' within our homes, in an environment we never could have envisioned," explained Deacon Kevin Mead. "Having access to live streaming of liturgical services provides a way to visually and spiritually stay better connected to one another," he concluded.

Deacon Jim reflects: "After getting over the initial shock of the quarantine predicament, various technology platforms have extended our ability to maintain devotional prayer and support each other. When we gather online for the rosary, the Chosen Father's 'party-line' and other programs, we see familiar faces and hear familiar voices. It has been a wonderful way to continue our spiritual growth as a parish community while being sensitive to the need for social distancing."

The youth and young adults of Saint Elizabeth parish have also used virtual means to come together and to stay connected to parish life. Within the parish Elementary Faith Formation program, children shared their athome experiences from the past week on Zoom

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Pastoral Care During COVID-19

Despite no public Mass, the Mission continued!

The Catechism of the Catholic Church defines a parish as a community of the Christian faithful and the pastoral care of the parish is entrusted to its pastor. According to the text, "It is the place where all the faithful can be gathered together for the Sunday celebration of the Eucharist."

During the past many weeks, we have been living through a challenging time. Because of the COVID-19 epidemic, it has been impossible to come together in large groups for Mass or for any other reason, but our parish still continues to operate as a provider of pastoral care. We are blessed to have online access to daily and Sunday Mass via livestream. We have been able to continue to share time and prayer with our priests, deacons and each other through the wonder of technology.

A drive-by pick-up of blessed Palm on Palm Sunday was one of the altered ways to deliver pastoral care during the pandemic.

In addition to livestream and video recordings of the Stations of the Cross during Lent, we had a drive-by pickup of blessed Palm on Palm Sunday, and online Easter Triduum services including the Holy Thursday Mass of the Lord's Supper, the Good Friday Celebration of the Lord's Passion and the joyous celebration of the Easter Vigil on Holy Saturday evening. We have also had prayer services for healing with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament and communal recitation of the Rosary, extensions of our devotional life while we are socially distanced.

In ordinary times, our priests respond to parishioners' needs with help from the Pastoral Care Office. Home and Hospital stewardship volunteers care for the homebound and sick with personal visits. They are extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion who bring the Blessed Sacra-

ment to those unable to attend Mass. They also conduct a weekly prayer service with Holy Communion for residents of two senior living facilities within the parish and provide a vital connection by offering emotional and spiritual support. During this pandemic, these volunteers have continued to bring caring comfort to homebound parishioners by sharing conversation and prayer via telephone.

In-person pastoral care visits have been curtailed for now; however, the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is available for those who are critically ill and in danger of death. The Sacraments of Baptism and Marriage may be arranged, but only with a limited congregation. The Sacrament of Reconciliation is celebrated in the church regularly, while always observing social distancing requirements.

While most of us have been staying home, our community has been here with support. Stewardship volunteers have gone grocery shopping with front door drop-off services for parishioners who are unable to get to a store and do not have family nearby. Approximately 40 volunteers participated in a pastoral care calling campaign and reached out to more than 500 parishioners over the age of 70, sharing information about available parish services while giving compassionate contact to stave off the loneliness that comes with social distancing. This connection has been reassuring and appreciated by all.

Despite the COVID-19 virus disrupting and costing lives throughout the world, our spiritual lives and well-being still receive the pastoral attention that we need to support and sustain us while we await a time when we can all gather together as the Saint Elizabeth Parish family.

School Spirits: Students and Teachers Adapt to New Way of Learning

n March 13, 2020, with three months remaining in the school year, life at Saint Elizabeth Parish School took a drastic, unpredicted change. As Governor Wolf announced the closure of all schools in Pennsylvania, students and teachers departed the brick and mortar building on Fellowship Road and embarked on a completely new and unprecedented way of teaching and learning.

"During the first two days following the closure, our staff took time to collaborate and pinpoint the concepts we thought were necessary in order to maintain the perspective and spirit of Catholic school," explained Principal Dr. Diane Greco. "We determined that our priorities focused on three things—the ritual and routine of prayer, the practice of self-discipline and the importance of serving others. We focused on maintaining these concepts as we framed our lesson plans."

"We also realized we had to have flexibility," she continued. "While we felt it very important that our students were able to 'see' their teachers every day, we knew they couldn't be in Zoom video classes all day long. We listened to feedback from parents and created an organizational framework consisting of a balance between class time and independent work, with teachers available all day. We designated Fridays for specials such as library, physical education, art and music so students were able to set up private or group lessons with each teacher. Counseling support was still there, which was especially important due to the emotional burden of the pandemic."

While challenges existed, such as lack of in-person encouragement and motivation from teachers, students and their parents persevered through the months of online learning, often with great resilience and creativity.



From Zoom video calls to drive-by graduation, the 2020 school year was much different than anyone could have imagined!

"Overall, I embraced the opportunity to work more digitally with my students," reflected Beth Hogarth, who teaches ELA and religion to fifth and sixth graders. "While nothing is better than face-to-face teaching and daily interaction, flexibility and adaptation are key attributes of growth. These are life lessons I stressed regularly. Our students are growing up in this digital world, so they were excited to try new educational sites, apps and methods of communication. We worked hard to streamline and enhance our modes of teaching and learning. During the quarantine, all reading, written assignments and tests were performed online, so as students worked on academic material, they practiced new technology at the same time. I truly hope they continue to take this fast-forward leap into the regular use of technology as a tool for the future. It was a source of pride for the students and will be their generation's direction."

"Teaching art from home was a huge change, although it really opened up the door for creativity," added art teacher Liz Griffin. "The greatest challenge was not being able to hold conversations with students and provide guidance about their art as they worked through the process. However, it was wonderful to be blown away when I received some of their final projects. I was so grateful for certain technology programs, such as Seesaw, which I used with my fourth through eighth grade students. It allowed them to post work, see other's work and make comments. I also enjoyed the parental involvement. Parents don't always know what goes on in an art class or the lessons behind a work of art, so it was nice to connect with them."

The administration is busy planning various scenarios for the upcoming school year, which may even include a combination of traditional and virtual learning, depending upon state mandates. "With much planning underway, we remain committed to motivating and challenging our students while never underestimating the value and importance of relationships and perseverance through challenge," stressed Dr. Greco.

Director of Parish Services Leaves Big Shoes to Fill

Mrs. Gen Miceli grew up in Overbrook, PA, attended West Catholic High School for Girls, and then graduated from Immaculata University with a dual degree in English and Elementary Education. She landed her first teaching job soon after flipping her tassel and never looked back! After getting married, she raised a family of four, and for a time the family lived in Middletown, PA. Then 20 years ago, her husband, Alan began working in Philadelphia, and the family moved to Havertown, PA.

"Father Mullin had just been named pastor at Saint Elizabeth and offered me a job," explained Gen. As Director of Parish Services, Gen has worn many hats over the years, including coordinating the training and scheduling for liturgical ministers, overseeing the safe environment program, serving as the staff liaison for a wide range of pastoral outreach activities (such as Sharing Our Bounty, Good Works, Joseph's People), social fellowship activi-

ties, and family life ministry programs (such as Pre-Cana and Pre-Jordan, and the Bereavement Ministry Team). Gen also served "ex officio" on the Stewardship Council, the Adult Faith Formation Committee, the Liturgical Life Committee and the Stewardship Day of Service Committee.

"It's a lot, but I've loved it all. These parish ministry teams involve hundreds of dedicated parishioners, who have lots of ideas, high energy and selfless intent. When team members propose new projects, I work with Father Mullin to review the projects and coordinate their implementation. I am always impressed with the many creative ways to serve those in need that are brought forward by the stewardship volunteers," said Gen.

After nearly two decades at Saint Elizabeth, Gen has seen dozens of new ministries added. Two of the most unique, she says, are the Interfaith Action Committee and the new Creation Care Team, which reflects Pope Francis' mission to protect the environment.

"I have never seen such a dynamic interfaith group like the Northern Chester County Interfaith Action Community, with which our parish interfaith committee collaborates. We engage with people from Buddhist, Muslim, Jewish and Christian faiths, among others," added Gen. "It's inspiring and eye-opening."

Gen continued, "Saint Elizabeth does NOT stand still! So many new ministries and programs have been introduced during my years here, as we design new ways to live out the mission and pastoral plan of the parish. I'm very grateful to have been a part of them all."

What's next for Gen? She plans to spend time with her husband and her 101-year-old father-in-law, in addition to her children and grandchildren. "I want to visit Santa Monica to visit my two daughters on the West Coast, but I am also looking forward to the little things like lunching with my friends, leisurely shopping and swimming more regularly."

Saint Elizabeth has been richly blessed by Gen's giving nature and warm heart, and we will forever benefit from her legacy - indeed, her replacement has big shoes to fill. "I'm most proud to have been the conduit of our parishioners' generosity and caring nature. It comes in the form of food collections, Christmas gifts, casseroles and toiletries for the homeless, visits to the sick and homebound, aiding the unemployed and caring for families with children who have disabilities. It comes in the form of volunteer teachers and coaches plus many other ongoing acts of kindness," she concluded.

"The staff and parishioners of Saint Elizabeth are deeply grateful to Anne, Barbara and Gen for their competent and dedicated service to the parish community in countless ways over the years," said Father Mullin. "And we pray that God will continue to bless each of them and their families in the years ahead!"

With a Vision to the Future!

7 hat blessings have come to the parishioners of Saint Elizabeth over the past 20 years, breathing life into a new parish here in the beautiful countryside of Upper Uwchlan Township, Chester County! It is a rare opportunity that you, as Catholics in the Northeastern U.S., have had to build a new parish community from the ground up, forming not just the visible and tangible elements of the parish facilities, but the parish's spiritual and pastoral life as well. Most Catholics in our area of the country have never had the experience of founding a new parish. So in the parish's 20th anniversary year, we thank God for the generosity, faith and enthusiasm of all the parishioners who have faithfully stewarded Saint Elizabeth Church from its establishment in July 2000, through the many years since then.

It must sometimes seem that in the blink of an eye, the parish is now looking ahead to plan for the next quarter century in the life of Saint Elizabeth, considering questions like these: Who is the parish today and what can we carry forward from the first 20 years? How can we use our many gifts of time, talent and treasure in the years ahead to maintain our foundation, serve the temporal and spiritual needs of the parish family and encourage others to join us in the faith community that is Saint Elizabeth?

In the spirit of responsible stewardship, and in consultation with many parish leaders, Father Mullin engaged the assistance of a local firm, LCDC Development Consultants, to proceed with a feasibility study intended to assess the readiness of parishioners to support a 25th anniversary capital campaign. The five-year campaign is envisioned to be initiated this fall and culminate in the celebration of the parish's 25th anniversary in spring 2025.

Many parishioners are already familiar with one of LCDC's principals, Lynn Cummings, from her work on the *Stepping Forward Together Campaign* to fund the construction of the gymnasium and the parish ministry center (2006-2007). For over 30 years, LCDC has worked primarily with Catholic parishes in our



region on feasibility studies, capital campaigns, increased offertory appeals and leadership/lay engagement initiatives. As managing partner for LCDC, I have been coordinating the feasibility study for the parish.

Beginning in early March, LCDC began to meet individually with parishioners for confidential interviews. This conversation asked participants about their sense of the parish today—what strengths and challenges exist, what their thoughts and counsel are regarding the proposed anni-

versary campaign and their willingness to make a financial gift to this effort when the time for making a pledge would come. LCDC would like to thank those who gave their time to the study interviews, members of approximately 50 households in all.

As interviewers, we were so grateful for the thoughtfulness and hospitality of everyone involved, including staff members who made space available and helped the schedules run smoothly! Some parishioners met with LCDC team members in the parish ministry center, while others participated by phone in the weeks since. Once the interviewers have completed their own notes, we compile all the data into a formal report, which provides the parish with valuable information about the level of support that can be expected from parishioners for the proposed campaign. In this way, the "voice of the people" can be discerned, while ensuring the confidentiality of each interviewee.

The entire parish community will be invited to a presentation of the Feasibility Study results — traditionally, LCDC has an "open town meeting" at a time most convenient to parishioners. At that time, we will share the study findings and recommendations to best prepare for and proceed with the 25th anniversary campaign for Saint Elizabeth Parish. Stay tuned for more details about the time and place for this presentation!

Because Sofia worked in the medical field, she was not allowed to leave Cuba immediately. After four years apart, Rolando, Sofia and Rudy were finally reunited in Miami, FL. Sofia began working as a dental assistant and went to school to become a dental hygienist because her certification was not valid in the U.S. The family moved to Radnor, PA, when Sofia entered dental school at the University of Pennsylvania. She completed her degree in 2011.


Chester Springs became home in 2013, soon after Sofia started her career with Chespenn Health Services in Coatesville. Her fluent Spanish is a valuable asset to her patients. Sofia says she practices dentistry with a "mindset of serving the community" and that working at CHS is very rewarding and a "true blessing." Rolando operates his own business from home, coordinating the sale of **HVAC** equipment to contractors and institutions in Latin America and the Caribbean. Rudy graduated from Radnor High School and attended Swarthmore College. He

now works and lives in Philadelphia, but is headed to the University of Chicago's Booth School of Business in the fall.

When the family came to Chester Springs, they frequently passed by Saint Eliza-

beth Parish. Rolando and Sofia were active stewardship volunteers in their parish in Cuba, but due to their many moves over the past decades, they had not settled into a new church community. They were eager to reconnect with parish life and their personal faith. Though following a Mass spoken completely in English was an initial challenge, recognizing colleagues, patients and the friendly greetings of Father Mullin made them feel welcome and right at home in a new setting. Sofia and Rolando have participated in the Stewardship Day of Service and adult faith formation opportunities, and they are now new members of the Pastoral Council, where they will serve together. "I know it will be another learning experience and very different compared to Cuba," Sofia said. "But we are eager to help wherever we can."

Rolando reflects, "We have loved exploring little by little the wonders of this beautiful country." The family has visited many local



historical landmarks and in the entire Northeast region, from Valley Forge and Independence Mall to the Smithsonian Museums in Washington, DC. They also enjoy trips to New York City to see shows on Broadway. Rolando also loves cooking and has found special enjoyment in the "new custom" of an American Thanksgiving, as he prepares traditional Cuban food to complement the traditional turkey.

A country away — and with a new parish to call home — Rolando and Sofia have brought their faith and Cuban heritage to Saint Elizabeth Parish. Sofia says, "We enjoy the fact that we were able to find a place again where we can feel part of a community." It is clear that Saint Elizabeth Parish is better for their presence here.

Sharing with Others from a Distance

The values outlined in the Saint Elizabeth Parish Pastoral Plan call each of us to "model our lives after the pattern of Christ in caring for the needs of others." Even in this time of social distancing, when it may seem difficult to put it into practice, parishioners have discovered countless creative ways to stay in touch with family, friends and their community.

We continued to practice our faith and to grow as a community of grateful stewards, and we have offered compassionate pastoral care by reaching out to those in need during the months of isolation. We donated blood, meals and food, or sent kind notes to help brighten a stranger's day. Here are a few of these stories:

American Red Cross Blood Drive

On Tuesday, May 26, the Knights of Columbus Council #13141 partnered with the American Red Cross to host a blood drive in the Saint Elizabeth Parish gymnasium. Parishioners donated a total of 44 units of blood. Each unit can be used to help three patients, so up to 132 people have been touched by their generosity.

Council member Matthew Ward has been the coordinator of similar blood drives for the last four years. "Our council is all about service to Saint Elizabeth Parish and to our community," said Matthew. "We typically have one blood drive each year, right before Thanksgiving. During this pandemic, the Red Cross is in desperate need, so we decided to organize another blood drive right away."





Matt went on to say, "We did a great job working together, although it was stressful at times. The Red Cross was struggling with staffing and frequently had to update their procedures in order to meet CDC protocol changes. Everything in the gym had to be perfect, including having the temperature set to 68 degrees to protect the donated blood. We used every square foot of the floor space to maximize social distancing; only staff and donors were allowed into the building."

Members of the Knights volunteered to help answer questions and monitor the door, all while keeping the proper social distance. Donors were by appointment only and, if necessary, waited in their car until it was their time to donate. "Unfortunately, after giving blood, only one person could sit at the canteen table while drinking some juice or eating a snack," Matt reflected. "During our regular blood drives, I like spending time at the canteen and meeting different parishioners. I really missed this part of the blood drive."

EFF Student Greeting Cards

More than 500 parish children are enrolled in Saint Elizabeth's Elementary Faith Formation program where they learn about their faith and participate in stewardship and community service projects.

Mary Damian is a catechist and teaches one of the second grade EFF classes. She is also a member of the parish Transportation Committee that brings parishioners who need rides to Mass on weekends. "A parent asked me if I knew of anyone that our children could make and send cards to," said Mary. "She told me she thought sending cards to some senior parishioners would be a



good project, especially since they are isolated due to their vulnerability to the COVID-19 virus."

Mary told the mom about one of the seniors that she drives to Mass on occasion and who lives in the Hankin apartments in Eagleview—and the rest is history. The students in Mary's class decided to make greeting cards. Mary dropped them off at the apartments, and her "rider" distributed them to the residents.

"The seniors were thrilled to get the cards!" said Mary. "And the children had fun making them. We make cards from time to time and

n June 19, Father Andrew Labatorio, our parochial vicar since July 2019, was appointed by Archbishop Perez as the pastoral administrator for Our Lady of Hope Church in Philadelphia. send them to sick parishioners, but this was special. It was a wonderful way that we could have an impact on someone's life, even while social distancing."

Casseroles and Food Drives

The parishioners of Saint Elizabeth have always been generous by sharing their bounty for food drives, making casseroles for Saint John's Hospice, or collecting candy after Halloween. In

this time of isolation, when so many are in need, parishioners have been extraordinarily generous in their support.

The parish casserole collection program continued during the pandemic. Saint John's Hospice has greater need than ever due to COVID-19. They serve over 3,000 meals each week to their needy and often homeless clients. A drive-through donation system was set up in the front of the

church for the April and May collections so volunteers could collect the casseroles from donors while maintaining social distancing. Our parishioners made 375 casseroles for the May collection and another 200 for the June collection!

The food drive supporting The Lord's Pantry and Saint Agnes Day Room was just as successful and well organized by the Sharing Our Bounty stewardship volunteers who collected, sorted and transported the food to the organizations for distribution.

During these challenging weeks, the parishioners of Saint Elizabeth have found ways to continue compassionate care for others. We helped the lonely or isolated with a card or a note, the homeless or unemployed with food and the sick with the gift of our blood. We have answered Saint Paul's call for us to "put on the attitude of Christ" and modeled our lives after Him in caring for the needs of others.



A Warm Welcome to Father Kevin Okafor!



ednesday, July 8, marked the arrival of a new parochial vicar for our parish, Father Kevin C. Okafor. He is a 39-year-old native of Nigeria who was ordained a priest by Archbishop Perez on June 20, 2020. Father Kevin celebrated his First Mass at Saint Martin of Tours Church in Philadelphia, his "home away from home" for the past four years.

Father Kevin grew up in a devout Catholic family in the village of Ojoto, Anambra State, Nigeria, where he remembers being drawn to the priesthood early in life. "I had a passion to be a priest from the time I was a young boy," said Father Kevin. He attended several seminaries in Nigeria beginning in junior high school and completed a Bachelor of Arts degree (2005) in Enugu, Nigeria, and later, a Master of Arts degree in Peace and Conflict Studies at the University of Ibadan (2012).

Filled with a missionary spirit, Father Kevin came to the United States in 2014, and spent several years as a lay missionary among the Hispanic Catholics in Colorado before resuming his priestly formation at Saint Charles Borromeo Seminary in Wynnewood, PA. There, he completed both a Master of Divinity degree (2019) and Master of Arts in Theology degree (2020). Before his assignment to Saint Elizabeth, Father Kevin served as a transitional deacon at Saint Andrew Church in Newtown, PA.
